The BOT are pleased to announce our Primary Objective to drive strategic decisions and resource allocation going forward:

2018 - NCEA2 Roll Based Pass Rate above 80%

2019 - NCEA2 Roll Based Pass Rate above 85%

2020 - NCEA2 Roll Based Pass Rate above 90%

These are aspirational goals but we have faith in our strong staff, our professional development processes including significant support from the MOE and we know that students and parents/caregivers will take up the challenge to achieve these excellent academic achievement results. These goals will require all students working diligently from year 9, so they are all encompassing. This year, we have been working with a number of Target Students in a process called Te Ope Angitū (the target group) to raise academic achievement, next year this process will be lifted to another level. We are also focusing on recruiting teaching specialists, we have recently appointed a specialist Maths teacher and a specialist Physics teacher with experience in Agricultural Science.

The Board believe that this goal will ensure that every student at the school is able to attain his or her highest possible standard in educational achievement.


